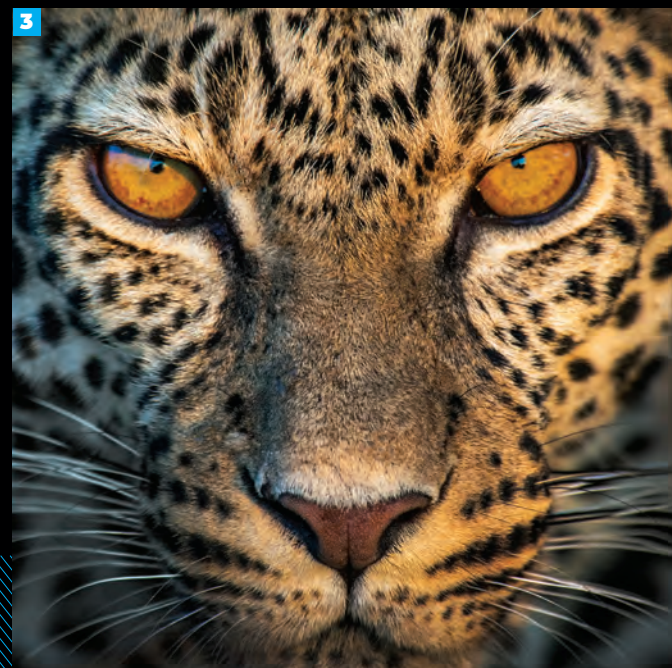

1 / *Power Over Parkinson's* showcases powerful portraits of patients and doctors who are focused on using exercise research to improve the lives of people with Parkinson's (PwPs). The half-hour documentary follows PwPs who are taking control of their disease in surprising ways including boxing and tango dancing.

2 / *3 Seconds Behind the Wheel* captures the often-hidden behaviors of distracted drivers. The film follows eight drivers over a period of six months, using in-car cameras and tracking technology. Audiences get a first-hand look at what these real drivers do while behind the wheel – from drinking coffee and eating, to texting and taking selfies. The film also offers a look at emerging technologies that could one day offer solutions to rising crash statistics.

3 / *To the Ends of the Earth: East Africa* Most people will never experience first-hand the wonders of East Africa, one of the last wild places on Earth. However, viewers can go on a breathtaking virtual tour of East Africa – and meet many wondrous animals that live there. This visually stunning program features the photography and cinematography of award-winning wildlife photographer Todd

Gustafson, and is narrated by renowned primatologist, ethologist, and anthropologist Jane Goodall. Viewers witness life-and-death struggles, as well as moving moments in the lives of zebras, giraffes, elephants, and more.

4 / *The Toolbox of America* explores the innovations that one family brought to manufacturing in America, and the transformation of one New England city that emerged during the 19th and 20th centuries as the "Hardware Capital of the World." Learn how New Britain, Connecticut, became the nexus of U.S. manufacturing. Working in tool factories sustained generations of New Britain's families – including the entrepreneurial Stanley family. Today, Stanley Black & Decker is the one hardware company that remains in New Britain – and its history is inextricably intertwined with this small town whose motto is "Industry fills the hive and enjoys the honey."

5 / *Let There Be Light* follows two grand masters of stained-glass art, artist Rowan LeCompte and craftsman Dieter Goldkuhle, as they create their last great series of windows for Washington National Cathedral. This hour-long documentary features stunning imagery as

it follows LeCompte and Goldkuhle through their fascinating creative process – and captures the tensions and surprises that threaten to derail the project.

6 / *You Are Cordially Invited* extends an invitation to viewers, welcoming them into some of the world's most impressive privately owned estates. Viewers follow host Holly Holden as she explores these extraordinary houses – strolling through the gardens, walking the halls, and viewing the details that make each house inviting and timeless. Holly illuminates the most interesting aspects of each house, drawing on nearly 30 years of experience as a professional designer of classic, high-end interiors.

7 / *Davy Jones' Locker*, a family musical adventure starring the world-renowned Bil Baird Marionettes, tells the whimsical story of a young boy who unexpectedly slides into adventure on the high seas. He ends up meeting a rakish group of treasure-hunting pirates who send him down into an undersea world, where he learns about the equally marvelous world of books. This award-winning film combines live-action film techniques with puppetry for visually stunning results.

8 / *Harmonies for Healing: Under the Streetlamp* is a two-part docu-series about the transformative power of music to affect positive change. Follow nationally lauded singing group Under the Streetlamp as they launch a singing competition to find talented vocalists with compelling stories to share. The goal is to form a "super group" of singers who will perform with Under the Streetlamp in a live concert. Featuring a wide age range of participants, from teens to senior citizens, *Harmonies for Healing* chronicles this heartwarming experience as 16 singers come together to create music and inspire others to follow their dreams.

9 / *The Kate – Season 4* *The Kate* showcases the art and personalities of bold artists who take to the stage with personal stories and impossibly good music. *The Kate* is filmed in front of a live audience at Connecticut's historic Katharine Hepburn Cultural Arts Center. Season 4 performers include the unstoppable, dynamic Sheila E., KT Tunstall ("Suddenly I See"), and Desmond Child – the songwriting genius behind hits "Dude (Looks like a Lady)," "Livin' on a Prayer," and a string of hits for Ricky Martin.
